TEACHING EXPERIENCE

World Communication Systems: JLMC476/576 (Iowa State University, 2005)

- This survey course of international communication includes both undergraduate and graduate students from various departments.
- Each student is assigned to follow media developments in a foreign country throughout the semester.

Political Communication Seminar: JLMC598H (Iowa State University, 2004)

- This is a graduate level seminar that explores the relationship between media, politicians, and voters.

- Media effects theories are examined and critiqued in the context of the 2004 presidential election. Special Debate Watch and Election Night Coverage Watch sessions were organized to facilitate student learning about current political discourse.
- To enhance class performance, online discussions, blogs, and chat rooms are utilized.

Communication Technology and Society: JLMC574 (Iowa State University, 2004)

- This graduate level class explores the relationship between technology and society from different theoretical perspectives, including technological determinism and social shaping of technology.
- Students develop critical skills to evaluate the effects of technological change in their lives; they are expected to bring current articles about new technologies and their impacts on society.

Communication Technology and Social Change: JLMC474 (Iowa State University, 2004)

- This upper-level undergraduate class offers a survey of the development of various communication technologies including the Internet, cable television, broadband and wireless technologies.
- Students learn to critically evaluate the effects of new communication technologies on individuals, companies/organizations, and society as a whole.

Multimedia Production: JLMC315 (Iowa State University, 2003 – 2005)

- This is a basic Web design class in which the students learn how to build professional Web pages with multimedia elements.
- The main software programs used in the course are Macromedia Dreamweaver MX and Adobe Photoshop.

Communication Technology and Society: JLMC574 (Iowa State University, 2003)

- This is a graduate level seminar that explores the relationship between technology and society from different theoretical perspectives.
- WebCT was used for online discussions of the assigned readings. In-class discussions were also an integral part of the course.

New Media Systems: RTV4420 (University of Florida, 2002)

- This course offers a broad overview of new telecommunications technologies.
- WebCT was used to enhance classroom activities.

Technology, Change and Communications: JOU4930 (University of Florida, 2002)

- The course focuses on the evolution of communication technologies through history.
- As a co-instructor with Prof. Mindy McAdams, created all testing instruments such as in-class tests and quizzes.

Applied Interactive Newspapers: JOU4946 (University of Florida, 2001)

- This course offers hands-on experience in creating and maintaining Web sites. Students gain newsroom experience by producing a weekly online magazine.

- As the managing editor for the weekly online magazine, *Newszine*, under the direction of Prof. David Carlson supervised students' performance on news judgment, copy editing, AP style and HTML coding (<http://iml.jou.ufl.edu/Newszine>).

Introduction to Broadcasting: J330 (University of Oregon, 1998 – 1999)

- This is an introductory course in electronic media. Students learn the basic principles of video production, including both linear and non-linear editing.
- As a lab instructor, taught the basics of desktop video editing using Adobe Premiere 4.0 and 5.0 software.

Advanced TV News: J420 (University of Oregon, 1998 – 1999)

- This is an advanced broadcasting class restricted to majors. Students gain real-world experience by producing a 30-minute weekly newscast aired on the education access channel.
- Supervised all aspects of student production before and during the show; assisted students with use of CG titling, switcher, audio board, and Teleprompter.

Electronic Field Production: J331 (University of Oregon, 1998)

- This course focuses on video production techniques. Students gain both theoretical and practical skills for producing different types of formats.
- Supervised students' lab sections for the class. Assignments included shooting indoors and outdoors, three-point lighting, sound and editing.

Mass Media and Society: J201 (University of Oregon, 1997 – 1998)

- This is a general education class that introduces students to media systems and effects.
- Assisted the instructor with in-class exams and quizzes, grading of written assignments for 100 students, and guest lectures.
